A New Memorandum of Understanding Between the Haliwa-Saponi Tribe and USDA Rural Development.

Among these achievements is the recent signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe and USDA Rural Development (USDA RD). This historic agreement marks a significant step forward in building sustainable growth and opportunities for our community.

The MOU solidifies a partnership that aims to bring tailored support and resources to the tribe, advancing initiatives in housing, infrastructure, economic development, and other vital areas. It represents not only a commitment by USDA RD to address the unique needs of tribal communities but also a recognition of the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe's vision for self-determination and resilience.

The success of this agreement is due in large part to the leadership of USDA North Carolina State Director Reginald Speight and the dedicated efforts of his staff, including Mrs. Shirlene Alexander, NC Area 5 Director, and Mrs. Pamela Sunshine Richardson, NC Tribal Relations Specialist. Through Director Speight's guidance and the collaborative efforts of the Rural Partners Network (RPN), access to federal programs has become more streamlined and equitable.

"This agreement signifies a shared commitment to creating pathways for opportunity and prosperity for the Haliwa-Saponi people," said Dr. Brucie Ogletree Richardson, Chief of the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe. "The dedicated work of Director Speight, his team, and the Rural Partners Network underscores the power of partnership and ensures that federal resources are more accessible to tribal communities."

The signing of this MOU adds another chapter to our story of progress and unity. It is a testament to what can be achieved when partnerships are rooted in mutual respect and shared goals. 



I took the opportunity to greet each of them with Back To School goodie bags that I sponsored and prepared in hopes of helping to start the school year out on a good note.

September was a busy month for me. On September 7, 2024, I had the pleasure of representing all of you at the Running Water Pow Wow in Fayetteville, NC. On September 13 & 14, 2024, I had a blast visiting with the Coharie during their annual pow wow. I also participated in our Community Indian Education Back to School Pow Wow on September 17, 2024. It was great! Our tribal youth did an outstanding job planning and putting on the event to share with all. Finally, during the month of September, my family and I celebrated my birthday (September 27th) as well as my Grandma Rita's birthday (September 29th) by attending the Lumbee Pow Wow at the Lumbee Tribal Cultural Center in Maxton, NC. In the month of October, I was honored to celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day with fellow tribal citizens on our tribal powwow and ceremonial grounds. The Haliwa-Saponi Pow Wow committee did an awesome job putting this event together! Our people showed up and had an amazing time dancing, singing and socializing. IT'S ALWAYS A GREAT DAY TO BE INDIGENOUS! On October 18 & 19, 2024, I attended the 52nd Annual Waccamaw Siouan Pow Wow in Buckhead, NC. It was a great weekend. The dancing, singing, vendors and overall vibe was outstanding and as always, the Waccamaw Siouan people made us feel right at home.

Of course, November was American Indian Heritage Month. While this month always seems to be hectic, it was a great one. I provided Tribal and other American Indian Heritage facts at the Haliwa-Saponi Tribal School in honor of the month. Every day, a different fact was shared with all students and staff during morning announcements. On November 12th, we provided fry bread to all Haliwa-Saponi Tribal School students and staff. Big Shout Out of Thanks to Mrs. Lori Silver for assisting with this activity.

Finally, I truly enjoyed attending our tribe's annual Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony and tribal meetings on December 6th. As always, I felt a great sense of pride and honor being in the midst of my tribal people. To top everything off, I was able to participate in the 3rd Annual Hollister Christmas Parade. I was so excited to see how many people showed up to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in this little bitty town of Hollister, NC.


