Food Outreach

January was a big month for our food outreach. At our monthly Food Distribution, we were able to serve around 450 people with groceries, prayer, and encouragement. Every month we're reminded how many families in our community are struggling, and it's a blessing to be able to show up with something as simple as food and the love of Jesus.

We also had groups from Ringwood and Woodward come out for a night of packing grocery bags. Together they packed and took home around 400 bags to use for outreach in their own towns. It was awesome to see everyone working together and excited to take these bags back to their communities.

We continue to hear story after story of how God is using these grocery bags. Churches are going out, knocking on doors, praying with people, and sharing the Gospel – and we're seeing lives changed because of it. People are coming to know the Lord through simple acts of kindness and obedience.

Mercy House Emergency Shelter

This month the temperatures in Oklahoma dipped into the negatives. We have gone from running our Mercy House Homeless shelter every Winter, to only opening up if there is severe weather that overwhelms the local Salvation Army shelter. We partnered with the Salvation Army through the snow and freezing temperatures and we opened our shelter for 4 days. Our shelter had the capacity to house men and we ended up having around 10 guests each night. We were able to feed them a warm meal, give them warm beds, showers, and clean laundry, and most importantly, shelter from the freezing temperatures! We are thankful we were able to partner with the Salvation Army through those few days and serve several people in need.
