HALIWA-SAPONI TRIBAL ADMINISTRATOR REPORT - July 20, 2021

Double-Sided Paper

Please continue to be careful and safe as COVID numbers are rising again and the curve in the U.S. is up after months of decline, with the new cases per day now triple in numbers. On 7/16/21 35 states reported numbers going up and by Monday 7/19/21 all 50 states reported numbers drastically going up in positive cases, hospitalizations and sadly deaths. Please Be Very Careful.

We are all very tired of hearing about COVID. But sadly we must remember this is the first major pandemic in over 100 years to effect the entire world. In 1918 the Spanish Flu was a novel virus (new) and it was not until 1921 that things were what many called normal. COVID is a novel virus (new) and even with the amazing advances in medicine we see that it will be sometime before we are at what many can call normal. Stay Safe!

The Humanities Grant will come to a full close on July 30. It was a great success and included several virtual workshops and conferences during the COVID Pandemic. One of the highlights was the Veterans Project done and filmed on March 13. This video and several others from the Humanities Grant can be seen on the Tribe's YouTube Channel. If you have internet access go to YouTube and type in: HALIWA-SAPONI INDIAN TRIBE. Total views combining all social media is over 3,000! We have applied for a 2nd Humanities Grant and are awaiting the decision.

The Homeowners Assistance Fund (HAF) webinar was this week and it was long and complicated. Over 1,000 participants took part from all over the United States with tons of questions posed on how this money is to be spent as well as when various monies will be distributed. We have been given \$76,500.00 for this fund at the present moment and are waiting for the rules and policies for implementation.

There is no information on the Department of Treasury Recovery Funds yet.

Gov. Roy Cooper's proposal of \$18 Million Dollars to each of the NC State Recognized Tribes is still in limbo. It must still pass the State House and State Senate as part of the State Budget.

Summer Camp is underway and doing well. The Multipurpose Building is also still getting improvements and repairs. So far we have a brand new sink and counter in the main room. The back door and back door panels will be completely replaced this summer as well. We are also looking into work on the back door landing. Work on the new floor covering will take place immediately after Summer Camp is over in August. For these reasons we are not renting the Multipurpose Building until after all this work is completed.

Please do not hang out at the Multipurpose Building Complex (unless using the Free Wi-Fi and using the exercise complex for exercise/recreation) and Please do not use the Multipurpose Building Dumpster. If you see anyone hanging out there or using the dumpster please call the local law enforcement and report it immediately. Some Tribal Members are already making reports including giving local law enforcement vehicle information. We are very grateful for the help. We are working on getting a full security system including full video for all Tribal Buildings. A full system for all buildings is a huge cost and we are working on a Security Grant to cover all costs.

TAPS Grants was approved to continue funds from 2020 and 2021 that could not be used due to the Pandemic Shut Down. We are now using both years' funds for Summer Programs.

CARES HUD Funding is almost done. We reported how this was being used in the last TA Report in June 2021. As soon as CARES HUD is done we can start spending the ARP HUD funds. ARP is short for the next round of funding called the American Rescue Plan.

The new paving at the DayCare and Old AD Building is finally underway. 811 was very backed up and the 3 day wait one might hear in the commercials is more like 3 weeks! Plus once again COVID issues on materials and equipment came into play causing back-ups. Hopefully all goes well and the new paving will be done before August.

The Enrollment Office started issuing Tribal Enrollment cards on July 12, 2021. Cards will be issued by appointment only! Appointments will be done on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. until further notice. To make an appointment or for any questions, please contact Tosha Silver, Enrollment Clerk at 252-586-1859. Appointments are going well but there have been some no-shows. If you cannot make your appointment please let the office know ASAP. This is just a trial scenario as we are working on many other ways to make sure we get new cards to all that need one, etc.

The TA has heard a lot about the sound in the Council Room and anyone that has been in a meeting knows about the sound in the Council Room. Sadly the acoustics of the room itself are mostly to blame. Good News we now have a new system! Now it is not perfect due to those poor acoustics but it is much better. The new system is a bit complicated and the new software is very advanced so bear with us as we learn its very unique qualities.

Tribal Administrator's II Great Plains Indian Trivia Contest - ANSWERS (page 1)

Questions:

- 1. What **animal** was the supermarket/grocery store, clothing store and home improvement store for many of the Tribes on the Great Plains?
- 2. What **river** was and still is the dividing line between what is now called the Northern Plains Tribes and the Southern Plains Tribes?
- 3. Contrary to popular believe and Hollywood stereotypes most Pains Tribes stayed away from Wagon Trains because of this main reason?
- 4. What **Plains Tribe** was so skilled in all aspects of horsemanship including breeding that they were often called the Master Horsemen of the Plains?
- 5. What was the most common and most powerful natural **weapon** of the Plains Tribes after White Contact and the introduction of the horse?
- 6. Among most of the Plains Tribes what heroic action in battle was more impressive than just killing the enemy?
- 7. Before the horse was introduced to the Plains People what animal was used for travel assistance and for food?
- 8. Name one Plains Tribe that was not nomadic and also practiced agriculture?
- 9. What was the universal language of many Plains Tribes?
- 10. What was the Feather Bustle now worn by most Men's Northern Traditional Dancers in the modern powwow after 1950 **originally called** by the Plains Tribes?

Answers:

1. American Bison (Buffalo)

The animal was used for everything from food to clothing to shelter and more. The hide provided clothing, shoes, robes, and blankets as well as providing the main covering of the Tipi, Sweat Lodge and other portable shelters. Hair was woven into textiles to be used as yarn, twine, rope and clothing. The hide was even made into boats. Bones provided tools and weapons as well as sleds (ribs). Even the bladders and stomach were used for containers for liquids and one time use cooking containers.

2. The Platte River

The Platte River was the dividing line for the Northern Plains and the Southern Plains. "*Platte*" became the French word for the Nebraska River but originally it is from the Oto word <u>nebrathka</u>, the Omaha-Ponca <u>nbdhaska</u>, and the Ioway-Otoe <u>nbraske</u> meaning flat water or flat river. The State of Nebraska is named after the Native Languages.

3. Disease.

Native Peoples rarely had contact with Wagon Trains. In just about every language of the Plains Tribes the words for Wagon Trains translated into English as "*Disease Travelers*." Native Tribes often stayed clear of Wagon Trains but some Tribes had toll arrangements for road use with Wagon Masters for payments of bags of coffee, sugar or flour left at specific spots to be retrieved later.

4. Comanche

While most Plains Tribes accepted the horse after it was introduced by the Spanish in the New World, it was the Comanche that became the most skilled at breeding and training. Their stock was well sought after by both Native Tribes and White Traders and White Settlers.

5. Short Bow

Before White Contact even Plains Tribes used the Long Bow. In fact well into the 19th Century some Cheyenne kept use of the Long Bow. But after the introduction of the horse it was discovered that a short bow was needed. Some of these bows were compound horn bows and quite powerful and faster then the early black powder weapons.

6. Counting Coup

"Coup" comes from the French Language meaning "to strike or blow" Plains Tribes felt that the ability to get close enough to the enemy to touch them or strike them was much more brave and heroic than killing an enemy from a distance. The French gave this action the name "Counting Coup."

7. Dog

Plains Tribes had domesticated dogs that were companions as well as beasts of burden in helping with moving possessions. Dogs were also food for the Plains Nations and especially for the Dog Soldier Societies as dog meat was the main dish before and after a battle and thus how they got their name.

8. Arikara, Hidasta, Mandan

Not all Plains Tribes were nomads. A handful of Tribes were more sedentary and heavily practiced agriculture. Just 3 such examples are the Arikara, Hidasta, and Mandan.

9. Sign Language

While Sign Language was rare among the Eastern Woodland Tribes, it was in heavy use as a universal type of communication from the Upper Northern Plains to the Lower Southern Plains.

10. Crow

"Bustle" is an English word for something worn on the lower back and is the common term for the Feather Bustle worn in the modern powwow after 1950 by Men's Northern Traditional Dancers. Originally the entire skin of a Crow Bird was worn on the lower back by many Warriors long before the modern powwow and was thus often called a "Crow." In recent years some dancers on the powwow trail are bringing back the term "Crow" and using "bustle" less.
