Tribal Administrator Report – October 15, 2021 (double sided page)

These first 5 points are about the ERA (Emergency Rental Assistance)

URGENT: We ask that all please read very carefully – the ERA (Emergency Rental Assistance) that helps with rent and utilities is for **RENTERS ONLY**. We have been stressing this since Jan when it was announced and since May when it started to be implemented for the Tribe. This grant is from the Department of Treasury and we should be very grateful that we got it as mentioned before most if not all of the funds from the first round of these grants went to BIA Federally Recognized Tribes only. We should be very thankful that State Recognized Tribes were included in this grant.

As of Oct 15 we have now paid over 250 months of rent and over 155 months of utilities for Tribal Members in now 6 states!

For the ERA - please when you apply make sure and fill out the application completely and with all needed documentation. Many applications are not getting processed because of missing information and incorrect information. Very important - We ask all please be patient and remember that you are still responsible for your bills as just because you applied does not mean you are approved.

Every application is unique and different and the assistance will not be the same from one applicant to another applicant depending on need, income and COVID impact.

Finally on the ERA – the DOT has announced as of Sept 30 they will start reallocating monies that have not been used starting in October.

The HAF (Homeowners Assistance Fund) is still waiting for approval. Due to this very long process the deadline for Tribes and Tribal Entities to request funds has been extended to November 15, 2021. Yes as stated in a previous report this is very long and very complicated but it will come as we got the grant and just have to get the Housing Plan part of it approved. As mentioned before this could take a very long time. As with the ERA most if not all of these funds in the first round went to BIA Federally Recognized Tribes only. We are very grateful that State Recognized Tribes were included in this grant too. This is very frustrating on the wait but that is part of the process. Please do not send or drop off your mortgage and bills to the Tribal Office. Please wait until we get fully approved and we will let you know when the HAF Application is ready.

The TA is working hard to bring more COVID Testing Clinics and COVID Vaccine Clinics to the area including getting gift cards to households that has been fully vaccinated (with proof from the CDC Card). At present one of these clinics is being planned for early November. More details to come!

HUD: Staff has been very busy writing over 20 policies to comply with the Final Draft Monitor.

SIGNS: When many different signs went up a few months ago we got well criticized by many here and even across the country. However in the past couple of months we have been greatly complimented on the signs for both traffic control and noise control by the Bank, Tribal Members, Visitors and most important our largest grantor and a few other grantors! One Grantor even asked how they could help with any signage needed!

In regards to SIGNS – please do not park in front of the Tribal Center – even if you say it is only for a few seconds or a few minutes. We have had a few close calls of almost accidents. And we did have one accident so far from one parking right in front of the drive blocking traffic and blocking others needing to get out that are parked correctly in the parking spots. For any visit to the Tribal Office please park in designated parking areas only.

Due to continuous various illnesses, RSV and COVID, the DayCare under the Direction of Miss Vicky had to delay again opening and has had to be closed a few days already in October. We please ask for all to be very careful and even more now with flu season upon us.

The AAA (Area Agency on Aging) Audit the last week of September went well. From the initial meeting we were told that all seems to be in compliance. We are waiting for the final report.

NAHASDA Training from HUD is now remote. The Council training on Sept 15 went well. Staff will have an all-day training on Oct 27.

The Tribe has been awarded a 2nd NC Humanities Grant! This is a Project Support Grant and funds must be used for an already completed project and thus the funds will be used to re-reimburse the Tribe for Summer Camp expenses.

TRIVIA CONTESTS: As of this month the Trivia Contest Games has awarded over \$1,500 in Food Lion Gift Cards to Tribal Members that have participated in 3 states!

CASH POINTS: The ATM is not owned or operated by the Tribe. The ATM was down for almost 2 weeks in September due to its own power loss and internet issues from the highway. It also does not draw any power or internet from the Tribe as it is a fully separate entity. When it is down please do not call the Tribal Office – please call the Bank with any issues and problems.

The OLD ADMINISTRATION Basement has flooded again. According to Maintenance this has been a common occurrence for years and years as there have been many things water logged or water damaged in the basement for many years. It has been decided that as soon as we get the new pump in that we will have to do a clean-up day to get rid of all the damaged and water logged "stuff" in the basement and do a full cleaning and sanitizing and bring a new contractor in to fully waterproof and repair wall issues and ground water problems.

The APR (Annual Performance Report) for the CARES IHP has been submitted to HUD and we are awaiting their approval.

Wiring for the new Security System for all Tribal Buildings is finally done. This took some time due to questions of costs and access to equipment...full installation will be taking place soon.

Sad news is the Multipurpose Building Floor (concrete slab) is in very poor condition. We now know why the vapor is so bad - A test core sample showed that it can crumble under the most simple hand pressure showing that it is full of air bubbles and has little cohesion of the cement to the lime and stone etc. We are working to see what the best viable option to fix this problem is.

NEWSLETTER & FACEBOOK: The Tribal Newsletter is public because it is publicly funded. The Haliwa-Saponi Voice Facebook page is not private – it is public and a "personal" page according to Facebook rules and policies. There is no official Tribal Facebook page but we are working on an official Tribal Business Facebook page with legal counsel. No one is banned from posting on the Haliwa-Saponi Voice Facebook Page...And no one has been told they cannot post on the Haliwa-Saponi Facebook Page. It has been requested that we be careful with posts and comments on the page per legal counsel and thus some settings are for no comments. It is also requested that some concerns be directed to the party that can respond and answer them immediately such as the Chief, Tribal Council, School Board, School Principal, School Staff, Tribal Committees, DayCare, Seniors, Staff and Administration, etc. If you are unsure on who to direct your concerns please call the Tribal Office. Thank You.

- 3. What two dance ceremonies were the most common among many Great Basin & Plateau Tribes?
- 4. This Tribe is named after the traditional homes they made from grass?
- 5. What art/craft was many Great Basin & Plateau Tribes well known for?
- 6. What Mountain was considered by many Tribes to be the domain of the Ute People?
- 7. This **dance** that became popular with Tribes across North America was created by a Paiute Tribal member in the late 1800s?
- 8. Who was the woman from a Great Basin Tribe that guided the Corp Of Discovery?
- 9. What **Tribe** was known for their basement like homes?
- 10. What **Tribe** gave its name to a type of weather front/pattern?

ANSWERS

1. Flathead

Early Explorers and Traders to the Great Basin & Plateau made a huge mistake in calling the Salish and Kootenai Nations by the erroneous name of "Flathead." Although some Tribes in the area did practice this body modification the Salish and Kootenai was not one them. Today they are still known by the term "Flathead."

2. Nez Perce

French Traders to the Great Basin & Plateau made the mistake of calling the Niimiipuu People a term in French that meant "pierced noses". While Tribes all over North America practiced this body modification the Niimiipuu rarely did and sadly got miss named by the French the term of Nez Perce.

3. Bear Dance & Sun Dance

These two dances were the most common dance ceremonies of the Great Basin & Plateau Tribes.

4. Shoshone

The names comes from the word "sosoni" meaning "tall grass" and referred to the very tall and strong grasses used by the Tribe to make and cover their lodges.

5. Basketry

Tribes all over North America made baskets for many purposes out of many different kinds of plant fibers...but the Tribes of the Great Basin & Plateau are most known for their exquisite basketry skills including making baskets that were waterproof from the weaving itself.

6. Pikes Peak

The Mountain called Pikes Peak in Colorado and named after Zebulon Pike was known long before contact as the Mountain of the Sun and called "Tava" and was considered domain of the Ute Tribe.

7. Ghost Dance

This dance was credited to a vision by the Paiute Native Jack Wilson also known as Wovoka (The Prophet). The new faith of doing this dance was that evil would be gone and a new earth would come about. Many Tribes took to this in the hopes that the old ways before the White Man came would return if they practiced this dance and new belief.

8. Sacagawea

This was the Shoshone Woman that led the Lewis and Clark Expedition on its 1813 Corp of Discovery across the western plains to the Pacific Ocean. In 2000 the United States Mint issued the Sacagawea Gold Dollar coin in her honor.

9. Yakama

This tribe lived in earthen homes that were also called "pit-houses" as most of the home was underground level much like a modern basement.

10. Chinook

This name of the Tribe is also the word used to describe a weather front/pattern of a warm dry wind that usually comes from the west and moves eastern across the Great Basin & Plateau and over the Rocky Mountains. The term meant "snow eater" as the dry warm wind could melt over a foot of snow cover in a day.




