Tribal Administrator Report April Meeting 2022 (double sided page)

RECREATION ROOM: The Recreation Room at the Multipurpose Building will be available starting Monday – April 25, 2022. Days and Hours Open will be Monday, Wednesdays, and Fridays 8:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. For more information, please contact Zenia Buffaloe at 252-204-2693.

HUD: The HUD Monitor Audit is not over. We are waiting for the response to the Explanation of Findings/Concerns submitted early Nov 2021. On typical an average Monitor can be a year to 18 months – but with COVID things have been greatly prolonged. If you can remember from previous reports the HUD Monitor had 11 Findings and 3 Concerns going back well over 10 years. HUD required that The Tribe write or re-write over 40 policies (some that did not even exist had to be created and some had not been updated since 1998).

STATE INDIAN TRIBES RECOVERY FUNDS: The Tribe has completed the first 2 steps listed in bold below. We are waiting for the response from NCPRO.

Step 1 - Tribe receives template from NCPRO and meets to discuss questions

Step 2 - Tribe returns template and budget projections to NCPRO

Step 3 - NCPRO processes documents and sends tribal organization electronic funding agreement for signature

Step 4 - Tribe signs funding agreement electronically, and it is routed back to NCPRO

Step 5 - Tribe and NCPRO set up PANGRAM account and tribe requests funding through grants management portal (called PANGRAM)

Step 6 - Tribe receives funds

Step 7 - Tribe obligates funds by December 31, 2024, and expends funds by December 31, 2026

Step 8 - Tribe completes reports on use of funds and returns to NCPRO (ongoing)

BOYS & GIRLS CLUB: We have hired a Director. They will be starting on April 28th. She is Dorothy Smith Richardson from Navarre, FL. We have posted the Manager Position and hope to post the Program Specialist Positions this week.

STATE VISIT: Executives of Blue Cross Blue Shield of NC will be making a formal visit to the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe on Thursday – May 26, 2022.

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS: GRRO has hired 4 CHWs to work with the Tribe on health needs for Tribal Members. If you have any health issues/needs and or concerns please call them at:

STAFF: Contrary to belief Staff is working very hard and Staff in the past and present have gotten "bonuses" the past 10+ years from Administrator Archie Lynch, Administrator Alfred Richardson, Administrator Archie Lynch again and also under the present TA. In 2021 Staff also got the first raise in 12 years to comply with inflation and the costs of living and it did not take away from any other funds, grants, or programs...this information was posted in the January 2021 Newsletter.

VOLUNTEERS: Several Tribal Members are Volunteering for various things including doing classes, cleaning, food distribution and more and none are getting paid as they are doing this 100% Volunteer. If anyone is interested in Volunteering with the Tribe please contact the Tribal Office. All Volunteer work can be documented and used for Volunteer hours for any service from needed requirements for schools, organizations and even IRS Tax Deductions.

Tribal Administrator Report April Meeting 2022 (double sided page)

COVID: Yet again COVID numbers are going up across the Globe and here in the United States. The new sub-variants are called BA.2 and Omicron XE. The CDC warns these variants are highly contagious. Please Be Very Careful and Safe. The Tribe and GRRO will offer a Testing/Vaccine Clinic on Wednesday – May 4, 2022 from 2:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. at the Tribal Office. This is for Testing and ALL Vaccines. If you have any questions, please contact GRRO at 252-432-6004.

LIGHTS: We are working on new and better lighting at both the C.H Building and the Multipurpose Building per Membership requests. It is much more complicated than one might think according to Halifax Electric as we own one and rent the other as far as poles, lights etc. and how they are controlled via different electrical boxes/lines even if at the same location (i.e., C.H. Building). Electrical costs/labor has also gone up extremely like most things, but we are getting new and better lighting for both areas and should be completed in the next few weeks.

ERA: As of April 22, 2022 we have paid or are paying <u>709 months of rent</u> and <u>320 months of utilities</u> for Tribal Members and more in 11 states and with 17 different Utility Companies.

NEW GRANT: The Tribe has been awarded a new grant from the Kate B. Reynolds Charitable Trust Foundation. This is an Improvement Grant for 3 years in the amount of \$100,000.00 a year with added costs of \$10,000.00 a year once the funds are released each year. The grant maybe used for the following:

Improve Health Care & Access to Better Health Care

Improve Housing & Access to Better Housing

Improve Technology & Access to Technology

Improve Transportation

Improve Tribal Buildings & Tribal Properties

Increase & Improve Educational Programs

Increase & Improve Internet Access

Paid Rent/Utilities for over 150 Tribal Members

Ouestions:

- 1. Who was the first European to contact what is now Middle/Central America? When?
- 2. What was the most important agricultural product in Middle/Central America?
- 3. Many products that are grown today all over the Globe were introduced to the World by Native Americans of Middle/Central America...list at least 4 of these items that originated in Middle/Central America.
- 4. What did the Native Peoples in the Caribbean **wear** that inspired Christopher Columbus' crew to give Costa Rica its name?
- 5. What were the 2 main great empires of Middle/Central America before White Contact?
- 6. What **Middle/Central American Native Nation** had the most sophisticated Mathematical System that rivaled even European and Asian Math?
- 7. What **unique material** did Middle/Central American Nations invent that would revolutionize practically all ball sports in the world?
- 8. What Cat did some Middle/Central American Native Peoples worship? Why?
- 9. What **Holiday** did some Middle/Central American Native Peoples practice that is still celebrated today with a mix of European traditions as well?
- 10. This **item** which originally grew only in Middle/Central America was most valued and sacred and was even used as money?

Answers:

- 1. **Christopher Columbus** in **1492** was the first European to make contact with Middle/Central America. *Many listed Leif Erickson circa 990 A.D. but that was not Middle/Central America*
- 2. **Maize** now called Corn. The word "Corn" originally spelled "Korn" is a European word for any kind of "grain." Maize was the premier crop of most Native Nations in Middle/Central America.

Tribal Administrator's X <u>Middle/Central America Area</u> Indian Trivia Contest - ANSWERS (page 2)

- 3. There are many items that originated in Middle/Central America that are now used all over the world. Just some are: Avocado, Chocolate, Coffee, Corn, Peppers, Rubber, Squash, Tobacco, Tomatoes, Vanilla. And one that surprises people: BBQ called Barbacoa by the Spanish this was a unique way of cooking meat very slowly over a very low heat used by the Taino Natives.
- 4. **Gold**. The Natives of this area had so much gold accourrements that the Spanish called the land Costa Rica which means *The Rich Coast*.
- 5. **Aztec** and **Maya** were the 2 most powerful Empires of present-day Middle/Central America.
- 6. **Maya**. The Maya knowledge of numbers greatly rivaled both European and Asian mathematics and calculations including having one of the most advanced calendars in the world.
- 7. **Rubber**. The Plant that we get latex to make rubber from is indigenous to Middle/Central America. Native Nations used rubber for many things including making balls for sports. Rubber over time because the primary material for many athletic sports that use balls.
- 8. Jaguar. The Jaguar was highly respected and often worshipped because it symbolized Power, Strength, Excellent Eyesight and the Subconscious. For these reasons many believed that the Jaguar could move between Worlds (Heavens, Earth and Underworld).
- 9. **Day Of The Dead**. This holiday was originally a celebration of many Native Nations of Middle/Central America as a celebration of Life & Death. Today it is a mix of both Native American and European traditions.
- 10. **Cacao**. The beans/seeds of the Cacao Plant are where we get Chocolate! The entire plant was very valuable and the beans/seeds were a main part of the monetary system for many Native Nations of Middle/Central America.




