

CONGRATULATIONS TO MR. Raul DeLaMora







CONGRATULATIONS MISS EMILY SILVER -CAMPBELL MISS UCLA POW-WOW PRINCESS

Tribal Administrator Report June 2022

COVID: The CDC Reported on May 18, 2022 that COVID is tripling in numbers and hospitalizations are doubling in numbers – another wave is here. Be Careful! The Tribe and GRRO will offer another Testing/Vaccine Clinic on Wednesday – June 15, 2022 from 2:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. at the Tribal Office. If you have any questions, please contact GRRO at 252-432-6004.

Thanks to all for helping with the Emergency Closure due to COVID. It was sudden but needed. We were Blessed that the Tribal Office only had to be closed for 3 business days Friday, Monday & Tuesday May 13, 16, 17. The Office opened back on Wednesday May 18, 2022.

The roof of the Old Administration Building has been repaired and updated with new shingles. It had some bad leaks for sometime, damaged panels and damaged shingles.

COUNCIL ROOM was closed for a deep cleaning and sanitizing on Thursday and Friday May 18-19, 2022.

The Tribal Office will be CLOSED on Friday May 27 for a deep cleaning and sanitizing of all carpets and all hard surfaces.

The Veterans Committee will be installing a new flag pole at the site of the new proposed Veterans Memorial near the Old Administration Building.

Katie B. Reynolds Charitable Trust Foundation met with the Tribe on Monday May 23, 2022 to discuss the new KBR Grant that was mentioned in previous newsletters.

Blue Cross Blue Shield will be here for a State Visit on Thursday May 26, 2022.

INTERNET: The 45 day period for grant requests from Internet Providers to the massive ARP Bill has passed. Several companies put in bids to provide service to rural areas all over the country including North East NC. As soon as any information on any company that gets the grant is released, we will let you know. Will continue to send out updates as this progresses.

ERA: As of May 23, 2022 we have paid or are paying <u>720 months of rent</u> and <u>327 months of utilities</u> for Tribal Members and more in 11 states and with 20 different Utility Companies.

TRIVIA: Contest 11 had a large participation! The Trivia has gifted \$5,350.00 in much needed Food Lion funds to Tribal Members now in 6 states. Look for Trivia 12 in this newsletter!

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS: GRRO has hired 4 CHWs to work with the Tribe on health needs for Tribal Members. If you have any health issues/needs and or concerns please call them at:

Tribal Administrator's XI South America Area Indian Trivia Contest - ANSWERS

Ouestions:

- 1. What was the great Native empire of South America before White Contact?
- 2. Name the insect that was and is a **food** for some Natives of South America?
- 3. What trophy did South American Tribes make from their enemies? How was this done?
- 4. What animal provided poison for Indian Tribes in South America? How was it used?
- 5. What country in South America is named after a food introduced to the world by the Native Peoples?
- 6. What sacred plant was and is still chewed by some Natives of South America? Why?
- 7. What animal was and is a food delicacy to some Natives in South America and became a common household pet around the world?
- 8. Some Tribes in South America practiced this ritual eating which is considered rather taboo?
- 9. What is a famous weapon/hunting tool used by some Natives of South America?
- 10. What Native South American term that means east is also a brand of candy?

Answers:

- 1. Inca. This was the largest and most powerful Native Empire in South America.
- 2. Many not a trick question as about all insects were valuable protein for Native Peoples in both North America and South America. While not called an insect in the Science Vernacular for Natives of South America a very common food was **Tarantula Spiders**.
- 3. **Shrunken Heads**. The entire head of an enemy was taken. Then the skin/hair was separated from the skull intact and boiled and stuffed with hot sand using a wood form to keep shape.
- 4. **Poison Frogs**. Most of the bright colored tiny tree frogs are highly poisonous. Native People would use the toxin of these frogs on arrows and spears and especially blow gun darts.
- 5. **Chile**. Originally the word had several meanings including "cold" and "ends of the Earth." After Spanish Contact and Colonization, the word became associated with the New World pepper plant.
- 6. Coca. The leaves are chewed and made into a tea to give energy, strength, and vigor. The plant was valuable both economically and religiously for many South American Tribes. This plant is where cocaine is derived.
- 7. **Guinea Pig.** These animals were raised domestically by South American Tribes specifically for food. Guinea pig meat is high in protein and low in fat and cholesterol.
- 8. Cannibalism. This is the eating of humans. Native Peoples felt that they would obtain the knowledge and spirit of the person by eating their flesh and or organs.
- 9. Natives of South America had many of the same weapons/tools as Natives of North America including Atl Atl, Bow/Arrow, and Spear. One famous weapon/tool was the **Blow Gun**.
- 10. **Andes**. From "Anit" meaning East. This is also the name of the famous Mountain Range in South America and the name of a brand of candy mints.


