Tribal Administrator Report July 2022

COVID: The May 4, 2022 Clinic was very good with:

Testing = 13

Vaccine Immunization = 21

The June 15, 2022 Clinic was also very good with:

Testing = 5

Vaccine Immunization = 31

GRRO was very pleased with the turn out for both COVID Clinics!

MOBILE CLINICS: The Tribe along with GRRO and Blue Cross Blue Shield are working on bringing other mobile clinics to the area including Vision and Dental.

HAF: The Tribes Homeowner's Assistance Fund has finally been fully approved! This was very long and as of this week some Tribes across the Country have still not even submitted their Housing Plan. Other Tribes in NC have submitted but are not approved yet and 7 States are still not fully approved. Applications will be ready sometime in July!

INTERNET: Due to Lumen/CenturyLink problems the internet at all Tribal Buildings has been on and off for over 2 weeks. It is a mess and we are at the mercy of Lumen/CenturyLink with so much red tape including issues of jurisdiction (seems strange but very true). This is yet another reason why we all hope that another Communications Company gets the bid for the massive Communication Grant from the American Rescue Plan to come to NE NC and provide better service!

FOOD: The Tribe along with its partners including Working Landscape, Access East, GRRO and more has gone well beyond any numbers we reported on in the past with several Food Trucks coming in late May and early June. As of mid-June the Tribe has surpassed distributing over 700,000 lbs. of food. Most of the credit goes to the Community Outreach work of Miss Kathy Harris! Please give a huge THANKS to Miss Kathy!!!!

BCBSNC GRANT: A very exciting new grant has been created just for American Indian Tribes of NC from Blue Cross Blue Shield NC Foundation. Some Grant details are:

- Four-year funding opportunity
- Tribal nations: \$400,000 over four years (\$100,000 paid each year)
- Urban Indian organizations: \$200,000 over four years (\$50,000 paid each year)
- Support infrastructure and organizational capacity enhancements
- Grantee- driven "learning community" coordinated by paid consultant

The Tribe created its portal on May 24, 2022. The Tribe's live Proposal Development ZOOM was June 15, 2022. Deadline for the proposal and budget is July 8, 2022.

ERA: The ERA will end September 30, 2022. The DOT has already started re-allocating funds that have not been spent. As of June 10, 2022 - Only new applications that are approved can be accepted before the funds are re-allocated. By June 20 the Tribe has allocated **\$454,659.66** for **725 months of rent** and **327 months of utilities** for Tribal Members and more in 11 states and with 20 different Utility Companies.

TRIVIA: Contest 12 had a great participation with some youth finally participating! The Trivia has gifted **\$6,750.00** in much needed Food Lion funds to Tribal Members now in **8 states**. Look for a totally different contest in the July newsletter!

HUD: The HUD Monitor Response has been released (June 10, 2022). Good news is that of the 11 Findings and 3 Concerns HUD has forgiven and closed all but 5 of them! Remember this Monitor went back well over 10 years of records and files and the Tribe worked very hard to remedy the issues of over 42 policies and procedures including writing several that did not exist that are required. The MR is 25 pages long and is in the process of being reviewed by Tribal Council and Legal Counsel Joshua Richardson. They will bring a report to the Tribal Membership.

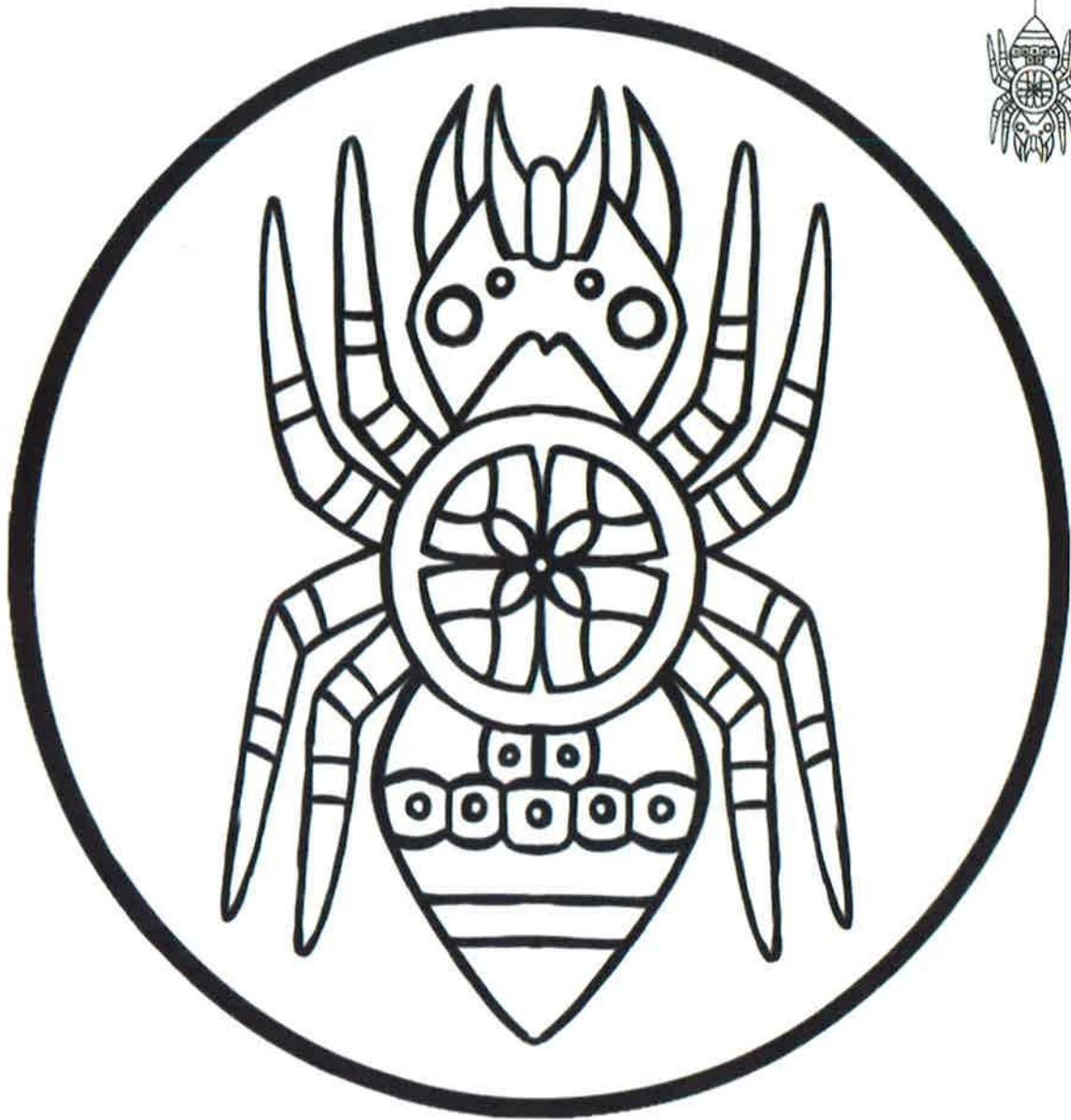

The spider was highly regarded as a clever animal because it could weave and catch prey using stealth and intelligence. The water spider was a part of the creation stories of many south east tribes as the one that gave or brought fire to the people. Water spider was always referred to as a she. The circles on her back signifies the bowl she weaved to carry the tiny coal back to the people to start their fires.

Questions:

1. What popular **sport** has societal and sacred meaning to Native Hawaiians? **Why?**
2. **Who** helped end the conflicts of the various islands now called Hawaii and unite them to come together as one?
3. **What outer-garment** did the Native Hawaiians make that was similar to a garment made and worn by the Eastern Woodland Native Americans? **What was it made of?**
4. What Native Hawaii **art/craft** is a symbol of honor and was made for the gods?
5. What **disease** had disastrous consequences and decimated the Native Hawaiians upon first Contact with the White Man?
6. **Who** was the first European to make contact with Native Hawaii?
7. What is the Native Hawaii **feast** where men and women came together to eat?
8. Although this **food** is an Indigenous New World Food – it is **NOT indigenous to Hawaii?**
9. Native Hawaiian cloth, blankets and quilts were made from this **material** before Contact?
10. **Who** are the Ancestors of the Native Hawaiians?

Answers:

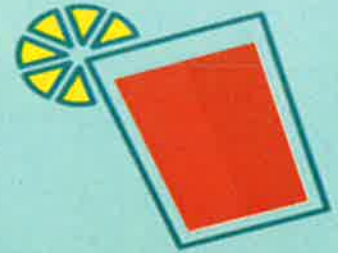
1. **Surfing.** This way of fishing, traveling and warrior training was practiced by the Native Hawaiians for hundreds of years before Contact. **It connected the People to the Ocean and Water Gods.**
2. **King Kamehameha I.** A Diplomat and Warrior, he united the warring islands to come together as one United Hawaiian Kingdom in the late 18th Century.

3. **Cloak/Mantle/Cape. Made from Bird Feathers.** The other Native Culture well known for making outer garments from bird feathers was the Native Nations of the South Eastern Woodland Culture of North America.
4. **Lei.** This woven chain of flowers or other vegetation was made in the honor of various gods.
5. **Syphilis.** While many illnesses gravely effected the Native Hawaiians, it was the STD Syphilis that first devastated the islands immediately after White Contact.
6. **Captain James Cook.** Most history agrees that he was the first European to make contact with the Hawaii islands in 1778.
7. **Luau.** Before this celebration was created and introduced by King Kamehameha II in 1819, men and women ate meals separately.
8. **Pineapple.** Often thought to be indigenous to the Hawaii islands, actually this New World food is indigenous to South America and Central America.
9. **Wood Bark.** Called "*Bark Cloth*" by the White Man it was referred to as "*Kapa*" and "*Wauke*" in the Hawaiian language.
10. **Polynesians.** These are the ancient ancestors of all Native Hawaiians.
