The Story of the HIV Wreath

Decorating one of the walls in the Hoak health center where Aspire Indiana Health's infectious disease team meets, there is a charming wreath that tells the stories of the people who have lost their lives to HIV.

> The wreath made its first appearance in 2010 for the anniversary of the HIV Care Coordination program (now known as Infectious Disease Services) courtesy of director Julie Foltz. In a company that cares for people living with this infection, losing a life takes a toll on an individual and their work.

> > With this wreath, you can see all of the red ribbons tied around it with names written on them. Each of them represents a person that Aspire has served who has passed away. Memorializing these people gives a visual understanding of the devastating impact of this disease - not only on family and friends, but their caregivers as well.

To continue the legacy of the red Michelle (Briles) Lamie, Jayne Weir, Savannah Tagua, Julie Foltz; ribbon wreath, there was an addition back row: Keisha Noethtich, Brandy Baker, Bri Green that started in 2021. There is a smaller wreath with yellow and purple ribbons tied to it to represent those that have died from Hepatitis C and overdose, respectively.

"Staff members, participants in the Madison County Harm Reduction (HARP) program and individuals we met at recovery events over the years contributed these names to the wreath," Foltz says. "The impact that others have on our lives is significant and stays with us through not only the wreath, but lasting memories and time spent with these individuals who have lost their lives."

With this addition to the original wreath, we can prolong its legacy and the many lives it represents for years to come. As science progresses and treatments expand, the hope is always to cure the infection known as HIV. Until we can find that cure, we look toward a future where there is finally an HIV free generation.

The need for these services in the Madison community and beyond is evident by an increased volume in HARP activity. Last month they experienced their busiest day ever with 46 participants, including six new people and five returning after an absence of more than a year. Eight HIV tests were completed and 83 Narcan doses handed out - all in one day.

Aspire Indiana Health is a recipient of the "<u>Connect to Cure</u>" grant from the Indiana Department of Health aimed at helping prevent and cure Hepatitis-C.

Aspire will use the funding to add two HEP-C case managers at its satellite locations in Lafayette and Muncie/Richmond. It already has one case manager in Anderson who works closely with the Madison County Harm Reduction Program (HARP), which provides services, medical referrals and support to active drug users. Sterile syringe exchange programs are shown to reduce the transmission of diseases like HEP-C and HIV.

Hepatitis-C spreads through the blood and most who contract the virus will develop a chronic infection that damages the liver, potentially developing into life-threatening conditions like cirrhosis or liver cancer. While there isn't yet a vaccine for Hepatitis-C, medications can cure an infection in eight to 12 weeks. An estimated 69,000 adult Hoosiers currently live with the virus and many of them aren't even aware they have it, according to an IDOH news release.

\$2 MILLION GRANT FOR HAMILTON CRISIS CENTER

Aspire Indiana Health will begin planning a Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) for Hamilton County thanks to a \$2 million grant from the Indiana Family and Social Service Administration's Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA).



CSUs, also known as crisis centers or drop-off centers, are community-based, short-term facilities that provide stabilization services for people in need of urgent care related to mental illness, substance use disorder or both. They are designed to help some of the most vulnerable Hoosiers and relieve overburdened emergency response infrastructure including hospital ERs.

Aspire will use the funding to plan the creation of a Hamilton County CSU including examining existing models, meeting with community partners to identify needs, gathering data including identifying the best possible location and partnerships, and researching screening tools.

"There are many different models of CSU, so we will be doing our due diligence by meeting with different agencies across the nation who are already providing this service to find the approach that will best meet the needs of Hamilton County," said Beth Eiler, Aspire Vice President of Behavioral Health Services.
