Fire Safety in the Home

Learning the basics of fire safety is the first step in fighting fire – and it just so happens to be the most important.

Understanding the best ways to protect your home and family or your business from fire should always be at the top of your to-do list. From selecting fire extinguishers and smoke alarms to knowing your state's laws, fire safety 101 begins now.

Steps to Safety: How to Protect Your Family from a Fire

Don't be a statistic. Be safe. A fatal house fire occurs approximately every three hours in America, and more than 20,000 people are injured or die from carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning every year. The numbers may be alarming, but just a few steps can help shield your family from danger at home.

Step 1 - Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years.

- Use Kidde Worry-Free 10-year sealed battery alarms and never change a battery.
- Choose the right alarm for the right location in every room and on each level.
- Test alarms weekly. If using traditional battery-powered alarms, remember to replace batteries
 as needed, at least twice a year.

Bio:

He is the grandson of Johnnie and Irene Richardson (paternal) of Hollister, North Carolina, and the grandson of Herman (d) and Beatrice Richardson (d-maternal) of Hollister, North Carolina.

Marson started his educational journey at Hollister Elementary, then proceeded to Eastman Middle School, and then graduated from Northwest High School in 1997. Marson accredits his love for writing, literature, and education to Mr. Jackson, an esteemed Eastman Middle School teacher who pushed him to recognize his hidden talents. Marson graduated from North Carolina State University (NCSU), where he pursued a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology and a Minor in Business Management. He graduated from NCSU in 2002. In 2019, Marson completed the Masters of Education, Educational Leadership Program at Grand Canyon University (GCU). Marson is a career educator, having taught at the elementary level at the Haliwa Saponi Tribal Charter School (Hollister, NC), Woodland Elementary Charter School (Sandy Springs, GA), and Greenbelt Elementary School (Greenbelt, MD), with over 20 years of experience. Marson has served as an Early Intervention Teacher, Instructional Lead Teacher, Talented and Gifted Coordinator, and Assistant Principal. Currently, he proudly serves as the Instructional Specialist for Area 2, Middle Schools, K - 8, and Charter Schools in the Prince George's County Public School district of Maryland, where he serves as a district leader and works to support school climate and culture and school improvement initiatives.

Marson's dissertation is entitled "The Best Practices and Perceptions of Elementary School Administrators to Address the Underrecognition of Culturally, Linguistically, and Economically Diverse Students in Gifted and Talented Education Programs in the United States" and can be found on Google Scholar and is published in ProQuest. In this study, Marson explored school leaders' perspectives regarding the underrecognition of historically marginalized student populations, including Indigenous populations, in Gifted and Talented education programs. Marson is a proud member of the Haliwa Saponi Tribe.

Tribes Recognized at White House Event







The "Rural Communities in Action" event, part of the "Building a Better America" series, hosted by the Office of Public Engagement took place at the White House on Tuesday, May 14, 2024. Chief Dr. Brucie Ogletree Richardson of the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe and Pamela Sunshine Richardson of the NC Commission of Indian Affairs attended the invitation-only event which marked the first in-person convening of all the RPN community networks and highlighted the Biden-Harris administration's commitment to rural communities, featuring a select group of rural leaders from across the nation. The event highlighted significant investments and initiatives in rural America by the Biden-Harris administration, including the American Rescue Plan, bipartisan infrastructure legislation, the Inflation Reduction Act, and the Rural Partner Network, among others. Additionally, it highlighted success stories from rural leaders and provided a platform to recognize individuals making a positive impact through partnerships with the administration via the new White House Rural Initiative. With only thirty-six leaders invited nationwide, Chief Richardson and Commissioner Richardson's inclusion underscores exceptional contributions and leadership within the Haliwa-Saponi Tribe. During the afternoon session, tribes were given recognition. Sokaogon Chippewa Tribal Chairman Robert VanZile of Wisconsin offered the prayer in his native language. Christine Sorensen, RD-SD Lead Management and Program Analyst gave a formal introduction of Haliwa-Saponi Tribal Chief Dr. Ogletree Richardson of Hollister, North Carolina. As one of the selected participants, Chief Richardson had the opportunity to share and highlight events of the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe. She gave a thank you for, the President's Cabinet member, Secretary Vilsack for the investment and coming to our area to bring awareness to the programs and funding, and to Rural Partners Network (RPN) for the work they are doing to help rural communities like the Haliwa-Saponi community in North Carolina. Chief Richardson stated that the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe hosted the Kick-Off meeting for "Closing America's Wastewater Access Gap." She highlighted that our Tribal government was able to bring USDA and EPA, local, state, and national leaders, and other experts into our community together for the first time. Within the Haliwa-Saponi area, our focus is on closing America's wastewater access gap in collaboration with USDA and EPA. We are one of eleven pilot communities participating in this project. Our journey towards equitable access and enhanced opportunities for all is a collective effort, and I am deeply grateful for the continued support from dedicated individuals like North Carolina's State Director Reginald Speight and his RPN Team. Together, we are closing the Access Gap ensuring that every member of our community has resources and opportunities they need to thrive."

The White House event was truly a history making day for the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe. This was the first time that such a memorable honor was bestowed on the Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe at the White House. As Chief, I am eternally grateful.
