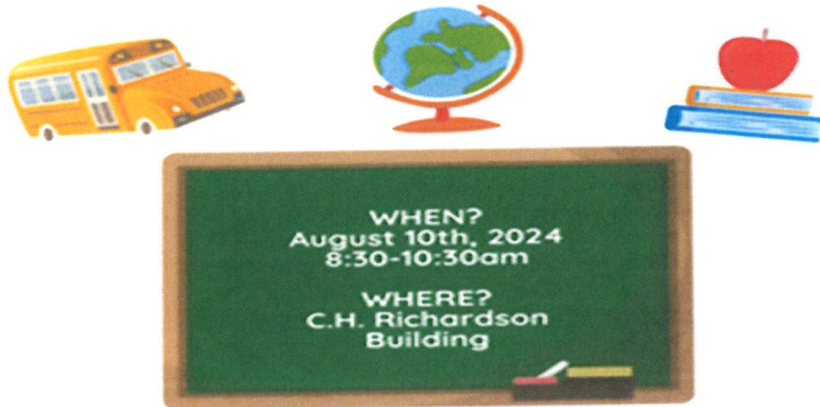

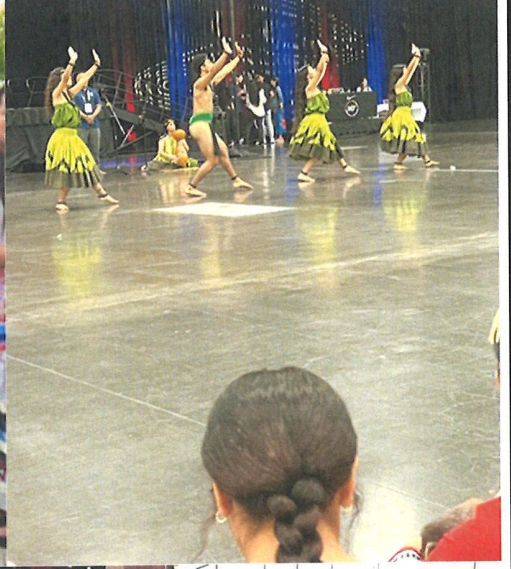
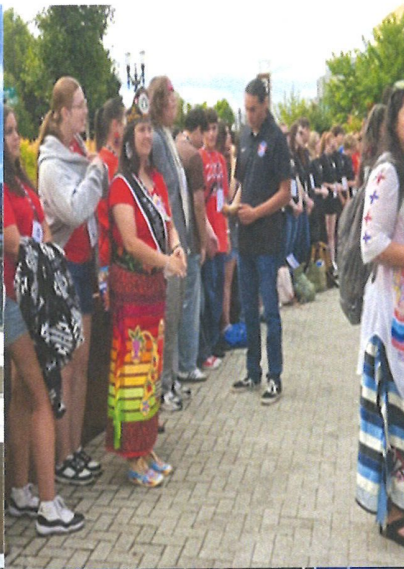

The area will be cleared of all surface trash, debris, deadfall, live trees, less than 5 inches in diameter standing at breast height, best management practices, will be incorporated to insure effective storm water runoff and erosion control on all parcels.

PURPOSE/SCOPE OF WORK: The Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe is seeking proposals from qualified, insured, and appropriately licensed contractors to remove and replace windows and doors at the tribal operated apartments.

Tomahawk Meadows Apartments are in Hollister, NC and were built in 1992. There are 15 duplexes consisting of 30 brick exterior units total, 1 handicap unit, 9 two-bedroom units, and 5 three-bedroom units built on raised slabs. There is also an administrative building. Units will be occupied during installation of windows, doors, and storm doors.

***Site Visit:** Pre-bid date at Tomahawk Meadows Apartments Administrative Building #162 Monday July 29, 2024, to see the buildings and what will be involved in replacing the doors, the windows, and the storm doors. While attendance is not mandatory, all bidders are strongly urged to attend. A specifications packet will be available at this time. Doors: pre-hung wood jambs, metal smooth slab, Energy Star with peep hole, 2 peep holes per handicap unit, front entrance doors only. **Windows:** replacement, double hung, Low "E," double pane. **Storm doors:** one half glass with kick panel (1-1/4-In heavy-duty aluminum frame). Exterior caulking to seal all windows and doors, using 100% silicone caulk or better.

All old doors, windows, storm doors, and other debris must be disposed of properly by the contractor.

5. Allergens are more controlled No one likes dealing with allergies, especially in their own home. Reducing allergens is another health benefit of a clean home for you and those who visit. Pet hair, dust, and other allergens build up in the home if they're not vacuumed or wiped up frequently. Those with asthma also benefit from living in a clean home because the air is more fresh and clear of irritants.

6. More likely to host guests Many homeowners are hesitant to host guests unless their house is sparkly clean.
